From the Desk of Your Editor:

Answer to the question posed in the February Måken is: The Poulsbo Sons of Norway lodge was formed February 22, 1916 by 36 men. The first nine women were admitted to the lodge in 1923 as an indirect result of women's suffrage. (Some would say nothing's been the same since!) While this information can be found online, I was unaware of it until I became involved in researching the history of Poulsbo for a new book. A group called "The Friends of Poulsbo History" has been working diligently to create this new book from the beginnings of Poulsbo through the city government centennial of 2008. It is going to be a fun book and will include many pictures of people and places as well as artifacts of different eras of the town. Can you tell I'm excited about it?! Everyone interested in Poulsbo knows about Mr. K's Poulsbo History book which, though out of print, is still in high demand. The new book will be complementary to that book although, when the new book comes out, there will be some differences simply because, with additional donations to the Poulsbo Historical Society and the use of computers and the internet, new information has come to light and it is possible to conduct more comprehensive research into timelines and events in Poulsbo through the years. If you have questions about the new book, you can stop in at the Book Stop on Front Street. Somewhere in this edition of the newsletter there will be another question for you to consider. It won't necessarily have anything to do with history, but who knows. Guess you'll just have to read on until you find it.

Since this is March, did you know that St. Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland, was born in the 4th century in Britain and thought to have died on March 17th. There are many interesting facts about St. Patrick—including that he was taken captive by Irish raiders when he was 16 and spent several lonely years herding sheep in Ireland. That's when he became devout in his religion. One of the most famous bits of information about St. Patrick, which may be fiction rather than fact, is that he drove "something" out of Ireland. Was it rats or cats or alleyphants, snakes or snails or boys telling tales—or something altogether different. If you don't know, you can find out when you read the April Måken. Be well, be happy and beware the Ides of March!!

Special Thanks

Thanks to Bob Stevenson for his presentation of Ski for Light at our February lodge meeting. We learned a great deal about another outreach of the Sons of Norway.

From the desk of Ralph Naddeo, our Financial Benefits Counselor:

VIKING VOYAGER

The bed rock to any solid financial plan is permanent cash value life insurance. Some of you have old policies that were purchased when you were young. You probably bought them because you thought it was a good idea to own some life insurance just in case you died early. I bet those old policies have not been looked at in ages but you have faithfully paid the premiums. I believe if you could find them and check them out that you would find that they have performed better in the long run than some of these fancy items we thought would give us a secure retirement. Most folks do not even want to open their envelopes and look how well their 401K, IRA or brokerage accounts are doing. Most are down by 30 to 40% or better. It is going to take a long time for these to even get back level and when they do get level they will have lost value due to inflation. Now on the other hand that old, dull, permanent life insurance policy has been growing by at least 3 to 4% every year. It has kept up with inflation and, if you needed to borrow money from it, there is no penalty. If you used it to supplement your retirement and borrowed the money out of it, it came out tax free. Ask yourself, just how flexible are these so-called government financial instruments that have been set up to benefit us. How many of you would in a heart beat trade in your 401K for a good old solid company pension plan. The only ones who came out ahead on this 401K caper were the corporations. They turned over the responsibility of providing a pension to you and got out of contributing 100% to the pension. Now their portion is only their match. I will be the last to tell one to stay out of the market but, before going into the market, one should provide a solid base so that, in case the market does collapse, all is not lost. We have gambled our future on Wall Street and most of us have come up short with no back-up plan.

As a grandparent, I have purchased for my granddaughter the old Viking 23. I believe it is my responsibility to help her get started right in building a solid financial base. The old Viking 23 is no more. It has been replaced by the Viking Voyager. This is an excellent policy to start our children on. It is permanent cash value life insurance and comes in amounts of \$10,000, \$15,000 and \$25,000. At age 26 it can be converted to 3 times the amount purchased. For example, if one purchased a \$15,000 on a child, when that child reaches age 26 it can be converted to \$45,000 of insurance with no medical underwriting. The best part is that one only pays once for the policy. For example, a policy is purchased for a 9-year-old child, the one time premium is \$476 for a \$25,000 policy. After the child reaches age 26 it is converted and then a yearly premium is due. This is an excellent way to start a child on the road to financial responsibility.
