President's Message

Sandi and I just returned from a 33-day "trip of a lifetime" to Norway. We crossed the country east to west by train, south to north by Hurtigruten (coastal ferry), and north to south by car. We saw all but the very southern portion of the country, and spent weeks north of the Arctic Circle with our Norwegian family (where my mother Dorothy joined us). All in all, it was an absolutely amazing trip. Some of our observations:

- The landscape is absolutely beautiful. Every time you turn around, there is another picture postcard scene right in front of you.
- The people are absolutely wonderful. Almost without exception, they were friendly and open – and nearly all speak English. We had family we had never met before invite us over to their houses for coffee and give us family heirlooms as gifts.
- We saw literally thousands of beautiful waterfalls, hundreds of mountain tunnels, dozens of incredible fjords, and only one intersection with a stop sign. They love the roundabout!
- The homes and farms are almost always very colorful and well kept. The barn is red, the house is white or yellow, and everything is very neat.
- Everything is expensive. Gas was about \$8/gallon, beer was \$10/glass, dinner for two was always more than \$100, and you don't even want to know what it costs to pick up a rental car in Harstad (up north) and drop it in Oslo.

We absolutely loved every minute of the trip and highly recommend it to all of you!

September is another busy month at the lodge, with something for everybody. Dance and Language classes start back up. We have Country Western Night on the 18th, the Member Picnic on the 20th, and a Financial and Estate Planning Workshop on the 29th. Details of these and other events are elsewhere in your Måken.

September is also the month when we elect a nominating committee to propose a slate of officers to serve the lodge next year. Our constitution requires presentation of the slate at our October meeting, and elections are in November. Back to Normal

How long do you think it will take for us to recover the losses we suffered over the past year in our retirement savings accounts? According to a recent survey, 32% of Americans believe it will take 2-5 years and 24% say six or more years. Another 23% (how sad this is) say they aren't saving for retirement at all. Here is a question that will test your knowledge of a fundamental investment principle: If you have a \$20 stock and it increases by 40%, how much is it then worth? Give your self an “A” if you said \$28. This is a trick question for the correct answer is **that it is not worth a penny, unless-and until-you sell it and (hopefully) lock in the gains!** Until you do that, the increase is nothing more than a number on paper. Do you think you can retire or stay retired with a comfortable lifestyle based on a number on paper? Folks, the investment arena has changed and if you want to have any gain at all you must stay on top of your investments. Years ago you could have purchased GM and put it away for your retirement. **Not anymore!** Here is another test of three questions to see whether you have a Financial or Retirement Plan.

1. Where will the stock indexes be in 20 or 30 years?
2. What will your home be worth in 20 or 30 years? (Not what you *hope* it will be worth.)
3. What will your nest-egg invested in the stock or real estate markets be worth when you want to tap into it?

If you don't have the answers to these questions, you don't have a **plan!** You're gambling-pure and simple. I'm not saying you shouldn't be in the stock or real estate markets, but before investing in these, you should have a solid base built on solid financial instruments that have guarantees in them. One of the best instruments is a fully funded permanent life insurance policy or policies. By being fully funded I mean where the cash value increases every year and the death benefit is there when needed. Too many of the policies written in the past were under funded and when the interest rates decreased, the policies either lapsed or more premium was needed to keep them alive. In closing, if you are sued, your life insurance is protected from creditors by Washington law!
